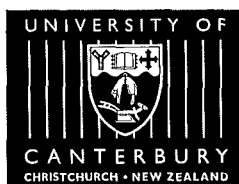

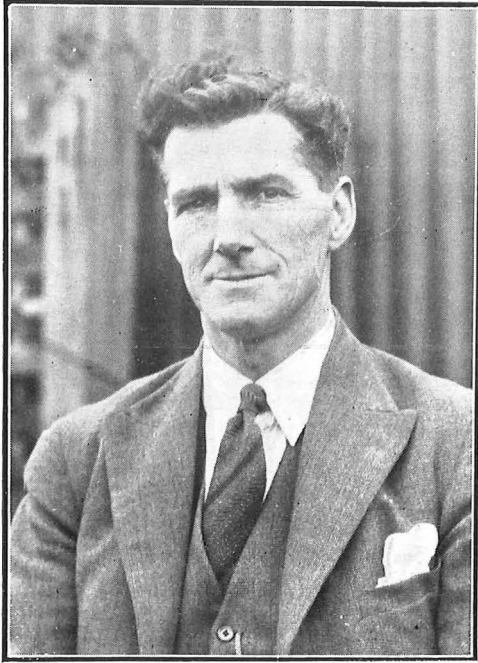

A Short History of the Spreydon School

Compiled by an ex-Headmaster

THE PIONEERS

“It is not chance that their achievements last,
Nor whim of fortune that their building stands.
It was for us they strove; we are the heirs
Of all their agony and sweat and tears;
And, willing or ungrateful, each one shares
In the vast legacy of toilsome years.”

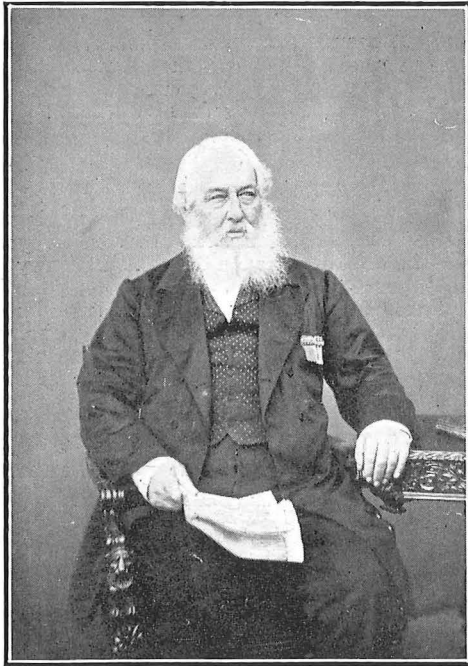
THE compiler of these notes for this Jubilee brochure has been considerably handicapped in his work through the fact that many of the official records connected with the school were lost in the fire which destroyed the main building nearly seven years ago. He has done his best, however, to glean from various sources as authentic an account as possible of the main features that will serve to bring together in a concise form the history of the educational facilities provided for young people in what is known as the Spreydon School District under the jurisdiction of the Canterbury Education Board.

The Spreydon School is situated on Lincoln Road, just across the Heathcote River from the north-western boundary of the City of Christchurch, a few chains past the Sunnyside Mental Hospital and facing Hoon Hay Road.

In the early sixties of last century, owing to the gradual growth of population in the locality above-mentioned, the need of facilities for the education of their children exercised the minds of the parents and became more and more apparent as the years passed by. On the 8th of August, 1857 an area of 50 acres of land, R.S. 121, was Crown-granted to the then Bishop of Christchurch; prior to 1865 a one-roomed building measuring about 30 feet by 12 feet, was erected on a half-acre site to serve the purpose of a denominational Church of England aided school, called the Upper Heathcote School. The attendance ranged between 20 and 25 pupils and during the years this school was under the control of the Church of England authorities, management committees were appointed, the successive chairmen of which were Messrs F. Piper, E. W. Seager and R. Page. Mr D. Davidson was master and Mrs Jaggar also taught in this school.

At a meeting of the Education Board on March 25, 1872, a memorial was received from the inhabitants asking the Education Board to consider the advisability of creating a public school district by bringing it under the provisions of the Education Ordinance. The request was agreed to and the Upper Heathcote Public School District came into existence.

Mr C. C. Bowen was deputed to represent the Board at a householders' meeting which was held on March 28, 1872, when the following were elected a committee "on a show of hands," namely Sir J. Cracroft Wilson, C.B., and Messrs J. Page, W. Pyne, E. W. Seager, J. T. Harrap, Thos. Dixon, W. H. Whiting and — Pigeon. The first chairman under the new conditions was Sir J. Cracroft Wilson. The attendance of scholars at this time averaged a little under forty, and Mr Donald Davidson was the master, his salary being £142 per annum.

The committee set about making inquiries as to the most suitable site available on which to build a public school. Three offers of land were considered, one being from Mr W. Hole of five acres with five chains frontage on Hoon Hay Road at £30 an acre; a second by Mr Harman of two acres three roods near the Mental Hospital at £60 an acre; and the third by the Bishop of Christchurch of the existing school site of half an acre and two and a half acres adjoining, together with the building at £100 for the lot. The last-mentioned offer was accepted by the Education Board on August 5, 1872, on condition that the residents of the district contributed £20 towards the price asked for the land, which the Board con-

sidered somewhat high. It was not, however, till June 11, 1873 that the Bishop conveyed to the Superintendent of the Province of Canterbury three acres, being part R.S. 121, for education purposes for £75, the extra £25 (to make up the £100) to be paid to Mr Archer, who was willing to sell his right of tenancy to the occupation of the two and a half acres for that sum.

In July 1873, the Education Board authorised the erection of a public school 50 feet by 21 feet with two porches, the timber specified being white pine. The tender of Mr Gee for £350 was accepted and the contract was completed in November following. The opening was celebrated on the 24th of that

month by a tea meeting, followed by an entertainment. A newspaper report giving an account of the function described the new building as "a very handsome one, contrasting strongly with the one previously used." In September of the same year, plans for a residence for the schoolmaster were approved and in March of the following year it was ready for occupation. It was built to the east of the school, not far from the Heathcote River, from which position it was later on shifted to higher and drier ground for health reasons.

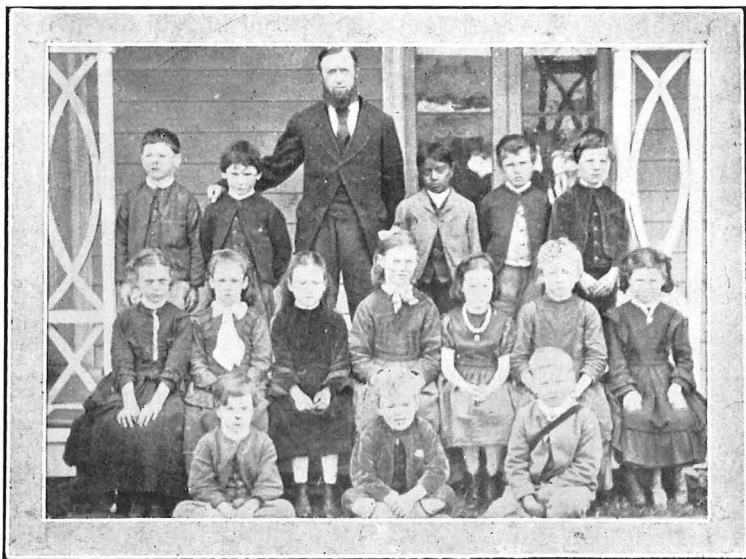
The first examination under the public school system was conducted by Inspector Restall on December 5, 1873, the following pupils being awarded prizes—Class I.: Andrew Henderson, James McDonald and James Whitaker Harrap; Class II.: Frederick Harrap, Rose Seager and George Smith; Class III.:

Isabella McDonald, Edward Harrap and Mary Smith; Class IV.: Florence Raxworthy, William Hancock, and David Petrie and Alice Le Messurier (equal).

After much correspondence between the Education Board and the School Committee regarding the disposal of the old schoolroom when the new one had been completed, the Board wishing to sell it by auction and the committee desiring it to be utilised as a district library, the committee ultimately got its way and sold the building to the Library Committee for the sum of £10. It served a useful purpose in the south-west portion of the school property for many years till 1906, when it was demolished, being considered a menace to the school residence, which was only a few yards distant.

The attendance in 1876 had risen to an average of nearly 90 and an addition was made to the existing building (on the south side) to meet growing requirements. In the same year there was a change in the headmastership, Mr W. G. Wray (a Durham College man) being appointed to that position at a salary of £170 per annum.

During the year 1880, the School Committee strongly advocated a change in the name of the school from Upper Heathcote to Spreydon. The main reason given for this was that correspondence intended for the school was continually

going astray, evidently through confusion with the Heathcote (Valley) School. The Education Board adopted the suggestion, and the name Spreydon has been retained ever since. A few years ago, the West Spreydon School Committee endeavoured to induce a further alteration, but the move was unsuccessful.

Mr Wm. Cuthbert was appointed headmaster in 1883; and on his decease in 1889, Mr F. W. Hunnibell took his place.

In 1883, the Board of Health wrote to the School Committee regarding the prevention of the spread of infectious

diseases by not allowing the school to be used for other than school purposes. The Committee sent a reply which galvanized the authorities into action. The letter made the startling statement that, while the Committee was willing and ready to assist in preventing the spread of such diseases, it was useless trying to do so while there existed the abominable nuisance of offensive matter flowing wholesale into the Heathcote River from the Mental Hospital grounds, and at the low parts of the river near the school percolating through the embankment and raising effluvia calculated to provoke serious epidemics. The Board of Health replied that the portion of the river where the drain complained of entered the stream was not under its jurisdiction, but it had communicated the position to the

Government, which had promptly decided to extend the underground sewerage system along Lincoln Road from the existing terminus at Dickens Street, Addington, to the south-west corner of the Institution grounds to prevent further cause of complaint of pollution of the river waters.

Another menace to health which greatly perturbed committees during the 1880-1890 decade, and which was not so quickly settled, was what frequently figured in the minutes as the "water nuisance." This referred to the fact that water from the Heathcote River was constantly encroaching on the school grounds owing to the unsatisfactory manner in which the overflow culvert from the flour-mill dam (on the opposite side of Lincoln Road) took away the water. The Spreydon Road Board was appealed to in the matter, but referred the Committee to "Wilson's Mill Dam Ordinance" and

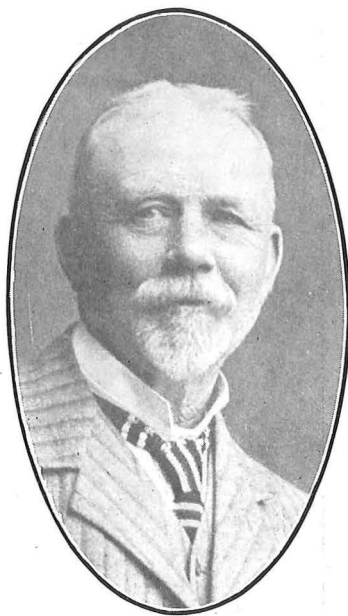

to the proprietor of the mill. The Education Board was urged to take steps to abate the nuisance and it decided to ascertain from its solicitors what could be done, but no decisive action resulted. Time after time, the Committee wrote to the Road Board, the Education Board, and to the owner requesting immediate attention. In sheer desperation, when an outbreak of

diphtheria was believed to be attributable to the constant flooding and seepage making the ground unhealthy, the Committee decided to brook no further delay. The local authorities were again approached; the Road Board decided to urge Mr ——— to abate the source of annoyance, but declined to do anything further; the Education Board threatened legal proceedings and the trouble was remedied.

In consequence of increased attendances, additions were made to the school in 1911 and 1912, which then consisted of four rooms in one large wooden building and a large detached infant room in brick, the opening ceremony in connection with the last-named being held on Thursday, July 25, 1912.

When Mr Hunnibell retired from his profession in 1922, he was followed by Mr J. Voss.

The old wooden structure was completely destroyed by fire at midnight on January 6-7, 1927. Four new detached wooden rooms of the open-air (Fendalton) type were built on practically the same site, together with a teachers' room, a headmaster's office, a large shelter shed of two compartments and a fuel and tool shed. The origin of the fire was never ascertained. Some delay in the rebuilding operations was caused

by a difference of opinion between the Board and the Committee in regard to the type of school to replace the old one. The former favoured one large building similar to the one it had erected at West Spreydon, the Department approved the plans and made a grant, and a large quantity of timber was stacked on the ground in readiness for an early start; but the Committee wanted separate open-air rooms. The Open-Air Schools League actively intervened, public meetings were held, medical men and others gave addresses in favour of the Fendalton type, and in the end the Board and the Department yielded to the strongly-expressed wishes of the householders. All this led to change of plans and hindered the commencement of work. In the interval, until the new rooms were ready for occupation at the beginning of the third term, the two senior classes occupied the large infant room, and the others were accommodated in a large marquee on the school ground (part time) and in schoolrooms at the Baptist and Methodist Church properties on Lincoln Road.

The need for an enlargement of the playing area exercised the minds of School Committees for years, longing eyes being cast on part of a section of land lying between the northern boundary of the school ground and the River Heathcote. After considerable negotiation, the Department made a sufficient grant of money to purchase from Messrs Murphy Bros. in October 1927 the coveted 1 acre 2 roods 18 perches, which makes the school property now consist of nearly five acres of ground.

On his retirement on superannuation at the end of January 1929, Mr Voss was succeeded in the headmastership by Mr W. O. Gilmour, who still retains that position.

The school is graded IV.C and is staffed by a headmaster, an infant mistress, an assistant master and two assistant mistresses.

The names of the teachers who have been in any way connected with the school during the past sixty years are given in another part of this brochure. Suffice it to say, they have laid the foundation of useful careers for large numbers of past and present scholars who have been, or are, or will become honoured citizens in this Dominion and elsewhere. Two features that stand out prominently in regard to the teaching staffs are that one headmaster (Mr F. W. Hunnibell) and one infant mistress (Miss M. M. Stephens) served in those capacities for thirty-three years and thirty-two years respectively. A great record, indeed, and worthy of special mention! What a meeting there will be between them and the large number of their former pupils!

The following scholars gained Exhibitions or Scholarships: Fred Clark (Board of Education Scholarship); Charles Clark (Senior Entrance Scholarship and Board of Education Scholarship); Annie McGettrick (Mrs T. A. Morland, Napier) Girls' High School Exhibition Scholarship; Samuel Macfarlane (Entrance Scholarship Boys' High School); John Searing (National Scholarship); Ruby Ray (Board of Education Scholarship and National Scholarship); Keith Hancock (Christ's College Entrance Scholarship).

It may prove of interest to many former pupils to know that the Spreydon School Committees do not now give prizes to the children at the end of the year. Early in April 1928, the then Headmaster (Mr J. Voss) wrote to the Committee stating that the members of the staff, while willing and anxious to help the Committee in any way for the good of the school, wished to protest emphatically against the practice of prize-giving unless awards were given to all scholars. This "bomb-shell" was discussed at length and the suggested abolition was favourably recommended to the annual meeting of householders, which approved of the proposed alteration. In 1931, the question of giving prizes or otherwise was revived, but the decision of 1928 was re-affirmed.

One cannot but be deeply impressed with the fine work done by members of school committees that have more or less controlled the local affairs of the school during the many years since its establishment, and a deep debt of gratitude is due to them for their valued services. Lists of committees will be found in another part of this booklet. The first chairman, Sir J. Cracroft Wilson, C.B., played a very active part not only in the early administration of matters connected with the change over from a denominational to a public school, but also in general local affairs. Mr Wm. Henderson was chairman for 13 years, Mr C. W. Comer for 10 years, and Mr W. A. S. Fenner for 12 years. Prior to his election as chairman, Mr Comer acted as secretary for several years; and Mr Benjamin Gott had the distinction of being secretary of the Committee for 16 years. In recent times, one chairman, Mr James Mackenzie, rendered yeoman service to the school and district and a great tribute for his splendid work was accorded him on his retirement through pressure of his professional duties. The present chairman, Mr T. A. Coulter, assumed the duties of his office in April 1931, and is taking a prominent part in the preparations for the Jubilee celebrations.

There is a good swimming bath connected with the school. The need of a "bathing place" for the scholars was referred to at a meeting of a School Committee as far back as 1883. On several later occasions, the Education Board was asked if it would entertain the matter of the erection of a bath, but want of funds for such a purpose always stood in the way. In April 1903, the annual meeting of householders appointed Messrs H. E. Gott (secretary), R. G. Thomas, W. Duncan, P. Trolove, J. Sykes, E. Hole and Mr and Mrs G. Adcock to act with the School Committee in devising ways and means of carrying out the project. This long-desired amenity came to fruition at the close of the following year, for the bath was opened with "pomp and circumstance" on December 17, 1904; and it has proved to be a valuable asset to the residents of the district as well as to the scholars. Prior to that time, secluded spots had to be used for bathing in the river Heathcote. What a time the bathers had on the opening day in their first attempts to swim the clear blue waters of the bath! It is on record that three boys surreptitiously sampled the bath before it was properly filled, and the matter of punishments was left in the hands of their fathers, to whom the delinquencies

were reported by letter! The contractor was Mr R. Heaven and the amount of the tender was £271/10/6. The cost was met by payments of £20 from the School Committee's Incidental Fund, £15 from its No. 2 Account, and the remainder from public subscriptions, bazaars, etc. There is a good outlet by pipes which lead down the natural slope of the ground into the river, and the bath can be emptied in a few hours; but, for some twenty-five years, filling it from a well often took

the better part of a week. This disability was overcome in the beginning of 1930 by the sinking of a six-inch pipe to a depth of 350 feet, providing a flow which can fill the bath overnight, so that practically no interruption is now caused in bathing facilities. The contractor for the well was Mr J. Stewart and the cost of £315 was met partly by moneys raised in the district by the local Swimming Club and partly by a £ for £ subsidy from the Education Department. The control of the bath is of course vested in the School Committee, but out

of school hours it delegates its powers to a very generous extent to the management committee of the Swimming Club, an arrangement which has on the whole proved mutually satisfactory.

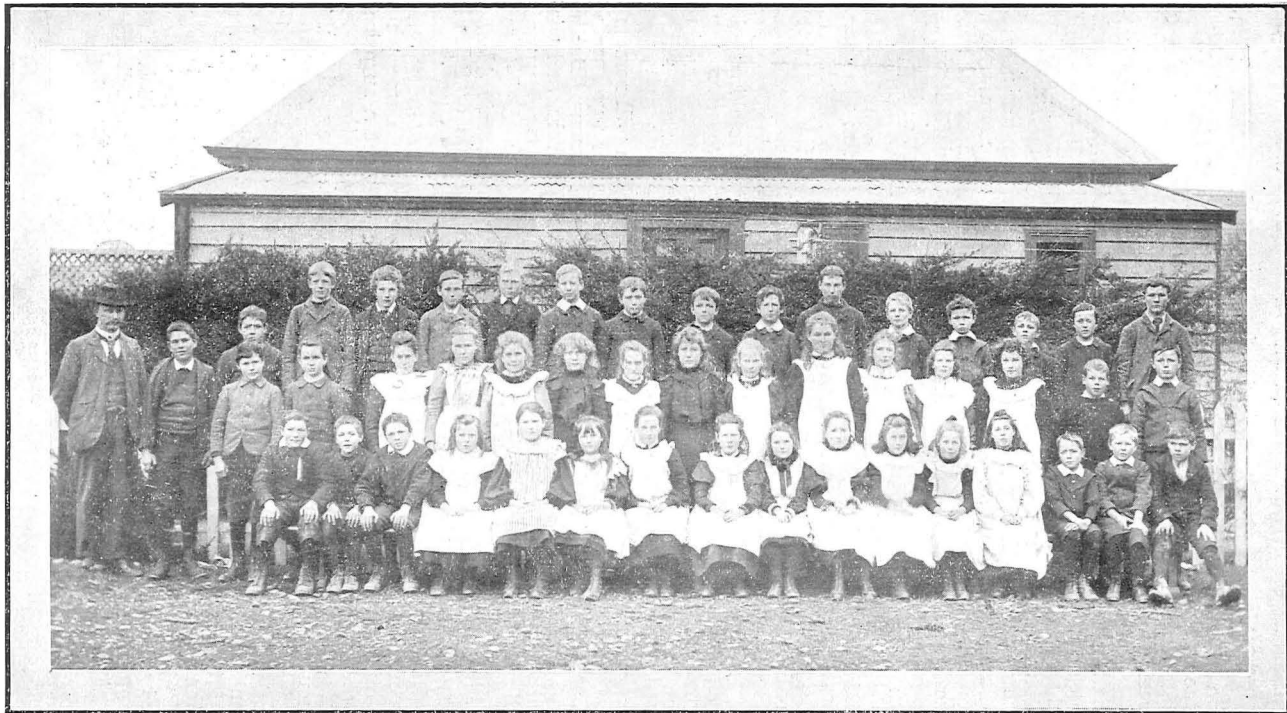
Water for drinking and flushing purposes is obtained from an artesian well sunk to a depth of 248 feet. A ram pumps the water into two elevated 400 gallon tanks, whence it is reticulated to all parts of the premises, including the Headmaster's residence.

An asphalt court provides facilities for tennis and basketball games, as well as for physical drill exercises.

When a great wave of patriotism spread over the Dominion during the dying years of the nineteenth century, intensified in the Spreydon district by the mobilisation of the Third Contingent (Canterbury Rough Riders) at Plumpton Park (now the Wigram Aerodrome site) and their departure from Lyttelton for the South African War, the pupils of the school subscribed £2/8/6 in sixpences and threepences towards the cost of providing a flagstaff on the premises. It was erected near the entrance gates and is 46 feet in height. The first hoisting and saluting of the Union Jack was performed in the year 1900 by Edie Hancock, then the senior girl in the school, and the event was made the occasion for great jubilation.

When the Government established the Junior Cadet system under the control of the Education Department, a company was formed at the Spreydon School, and the boys in their Glengarry caps and neat uniforms made an imposing spectacle in their physical and ceremonial drill exercises. Rifle shooting was practised at the Lyttelton butts close to the artillery barracks, and camps, which were attended by companies from many Canterbury schools, were held under strict military discipline and conditions. No doubt many of the ex-scholars will remember the big camp on the Rangiora Showgrounds for two special but entirely different reasons—one being the famous "Battle of the Ashley River" in which they fought so bravely, and the other the innumerable sausages and other comestibles that disappeared at meal times.

The grounds connected with the school have received considerable attention from time to time at the hands of School Committees and will compare more than favourably with those of any other school in the city or suburbs. In the spring and summer they present a truly picturesque sight. Those who have not seen them for the past few years will get a surprise when they visit the school for the Jubilee celebrations. The grown-up girls will look for the spots where they built fir houses in cosy nooks under the trees, and the old boys (perhaps girls, too) will search in vain for the willows with their branches growing so conveniently across the river. The high and wide macrocarpa hedges on the roadside and to the east of the school residence have gone; but the ford, in the clear, gently-rippling waters of which many boys and girls wetted their feet on their way home, is still there; though the big water wheel which provided the motive power for the flour mill on the opposite side was dismantled long ago. The agricultural nature study plots that used to be to the right of the entrance

gates have now a new "possie" in the extreme north-west corner on the opposite side of the river to the beautiful grounds surrounding the residence of the Medical Superintendent of the Mental Hospital. The original garden was always a bright spot in the playground. Unfortunately it was obscured from public view by a high macrocarpa hedge, but it was greatly admired by all who saw it. More than once it gained first prize in the school gardens competitions for its neatness, its variety of flowers, its vegetables and its educational value. Many, too, were the honours that were won at the annual school horticultural competitions then held. The planting of trees, shrubs and flowers has added greatly to the general appearance of the grounds, and advantage has been, and is being taken of the Government Unemployment Scheme in securing the services of workmen for levelling, grading and otherwise improving the property, more particularly the newly-acquired area, which, at the time of purchase was in a decidedly rough state. The success attained in recent years in laying out and beautifying the school area is due largely to the efforts of Messrs W. J. Wills and James Mackenzie, who deserve the best thanks not only of the parents but also of the community in general. It may truly be said of the former that, over a long period of years, his wonderful and persistent interest in this connection has in it all the elements of a pet hobby "dear to his heart."

Items from Old Minute Books

Compiled by an ex-Headmaster

The following items of interest have been gleaned from minute books of School Committees.

1. Letter sent to a well-known ex-resident requesting him "to remove without delay the goat at present grazing on the school grounds."

2. Resolved to write to Miss ——, an applicant for a vacancy as pupil teacher, asking "if she can teach music and sewing."

3. Letter from Spreydon Road Board requesting the Committee to pay its share of expenses of cleaning the Heathcote River fronting on the school ground. Resolved to reply declining to do so "as there is no frontage to the river."

4. Resolved to inform the Headmaster "that the whole school shall not be kept in when the schoolmaster cannot find out the offender, except in very aggravated cases."

5. "That no children be punished in any way for not buying from the schoolmaster any books they may require."

6. Extract from caretaker's schedule of duties: "School to be swept out every evening, dusted every morning with a dry duster, and washed out every Saturday."

7. Resolved "To request the master not to allow the caretaker to dip his bucket in the water trough."

8. Decided to ask the Headmaster why singing was not being taught in the school. He replied that "owing to a delicate throat, it would not stand the strain." Later on, learning that no attempt had been made to teach singing, the Committee "request that it be immediately taught." One lesson was given, and the instruction again ceased. The Committee learned "that the Headmaster is in the habit of singing elsewhere" and asked for an explanation.

9. Resolved "To ask the Headmaster if it is a fact that Miss —— keeps a large fire in a small room with closed windows, to the detriment of the children's health."

10. It came under the notice of one Committee that on two occasions boys had been sent away from school to mind a cow and a goat, and request made that "it must not occur again."

11. In 1912, a circular was issued to parents stating that, for ventilation and lighting, the new brick infant room was regarded at that time as being the most up-to-date classroom in the North Canterbury district. (How adversely opinions have changed in the two decades since then!)

12. Resolved "That Constable McGill be asked to visit the school and inspect the registers for names of absentees." The request was acceded to and the resultant increase in the attendance showed that the policeman had been "on the job."

13. A resident made application for permission to cut the grass on the playground. Granted on condition that "he promises to cut it well."

14. List of members present at a committee meeting: "All present except the Boss" (chairman).

15. Resolved "That the Headmaster be informed that when it is necessary for children to be kept in after school hours one of the teachers remain with them until released."

16. A week's holiday had been granted for Carnival Week (November). Reported to Committee "that several boys from the Spreydon School had been troublesome on the Showgrounds during Show Week." Resolved "That the incoming Committee be recommended to consider the advisability or otherwise of giving a full week next year."

17. Decided "that a case of bananas be bought for a special (train) trip to Rangiora for those who pass their exams." Other similar trips were made to Sumner and Governor's Bay. The bait succeeded in improving attendances!

18. "Fine weather, agreeable company and a full table made the treat a really good one." (March 1892).

19. Candidate for Parliamentary honours threatened with legal proceedings for breaking into the school for a political meeting when the doors were found to be locked.

Natural Football

THIS Jubilee calls up many memories, and out of the total it is hard to pick one that will interest everybody. But standing out clearly in the mind of the writer is a football match that was played somewhere about the year 1895—imagine it, nearly forty years ago.

Spreydon had as pupil teacher an enthusiastic footballer who was keen to see his youthful team in action. Riccarton's Headmaster was very chummy with the gentleman who ruled Spreydon with an iron heel. A match was arranged. This in itself was an elaborate process in those days when school sports were unorganised, and such luxuries as weekly competitions in football, basketball or cricket were undreamed of. The best writer in the school was engaged for a whole morning copying out a grandiloquent challenge. This was accepted with appropriate formality and the date was fixed.

Much "private" training was indulged in. Schoolboys were not "fed up with life" in those days. They ran round the block—every boy has a block to run round. They lifted heavy weights; they helped father shovel shingle while father wondered what was wrong. And as to diet it is on record that an unprecedented amount of raw beef steak was consumed in a fortnight. The school had no colours and few jerseys, but by the day of the match every player had either borrowed or bought some sort of suitable costume, the general colour scheme being decidedly kaleidoscopic.

The longed-for day of battle arrived. The team set forth—no, not in motor cars nor in a coach—they merely walked. It was a great trek, up the "Asylum Road," past Middleton Station and then along Riccarton Road. Not a single member of the team had ever played against "a foreigner" or out of his own playground. As the "enemy" school hove in sight most of the team began to wish they had stayed at home. Confidence was waning. We were but a handful against a whole yelling horde. We were strangers on a strange ground. And then a frightful thing happened. A team of giants came into view. We could almost see their whiskers so violently did our teeth chatter and our imaginations work. There was no lack of pluck but for an epic instance of stage fright and nerves it is not recorded that anything approaching the condition of those ancient Spreydonians has ever been witnessed.

The game began. Our feet clung to the ground; each boy immediately lost his head; forwards, full-back, wings, halves and five-eighths blended in one wild welter. And then—a Riccarton player, shod with rubber shoes, seized the ball and sped for the goal. He was unquestionably the fastest runner of his day—so we thought. He left us standing flat-footed, crossed the line—an imaginary one—and to our disgust, ran round some trees to score between the posts which consisted of two *macrocarpa* trees about thirty feet in diameter. The

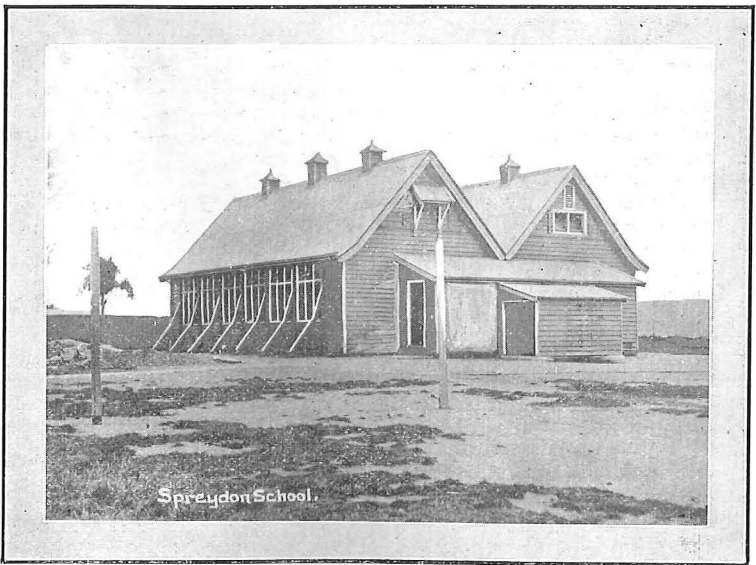
kick at goal was a poster, the ball being lost for some minutes in the left hand tree.

The sidelines were likewise a row of trees and this fact made exactness of touchlines decisions impossible. The game seethed on and nearly every time the speedy rubber-shod one procured the ball he reached the bush and emerged behind the posts.

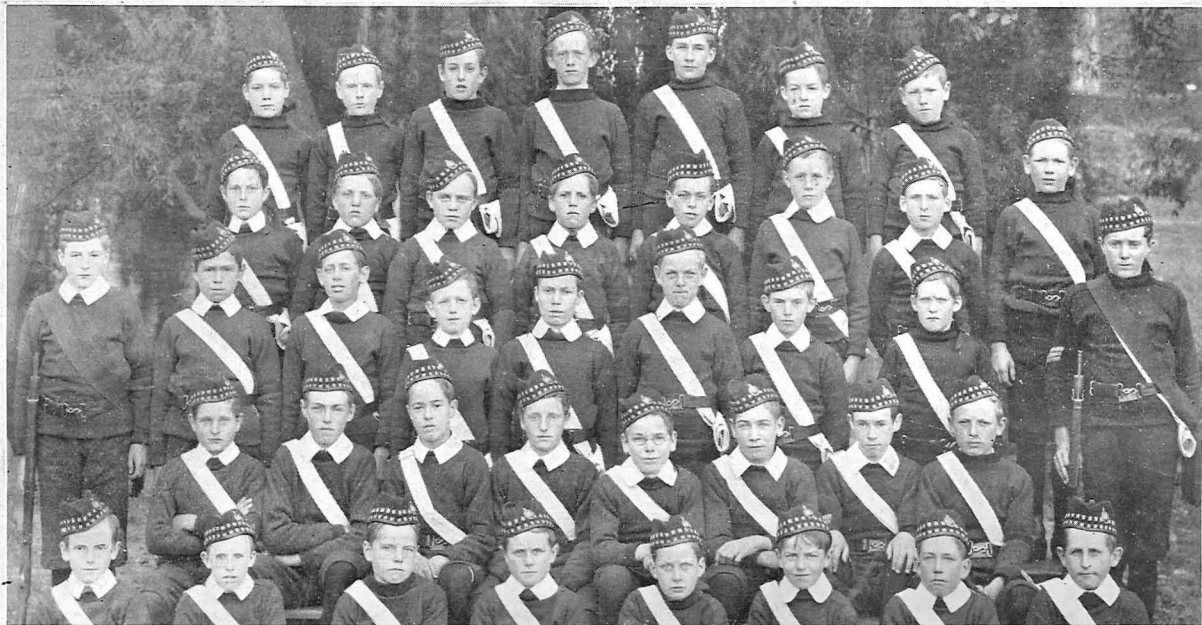
At half-time there was some parleying as to conditions but we humbly believed that in Riccarton boys grew very big before passing standard 6 and gritted our teeth for the second half. It would be straining the facts to say that anyone stayed in his place but most boys got over their "nerves" and simply tore into it—a kind of "catch as catch can" free style. That Spreydon were beaten by about twenty-one to nil is authentic history. The team returned sobered, sore and sorry, but not downhearted. Several of the keenest combatants had to leave soon after and were not permitted the joy of a return match which in the light of experience would certainly have been an Homeric contest.

Such was our simple football match—the only one of the season. How we enjoyed it all! How we look back on the memory!

"We honour yet the school we knew
The best school of all;
For, working days or holidays,
And glad or melancholy days,
They were great days and jolly days
At the best school of all."

Resenting such unwarranted punishment, Neil threw the then "familiar" missile, the slate, which losing its frame in flight, cut the waistcoat of a respected teacher and continuing its course embedded itself in the wall, fortunately with no further serious results.

[Editor's Note: We are pleased to say that with the great advance in primary education, this practice has now ceased.]

Even our school is not without its "celebrities." W.G.W. was reputed to be a man of many moods and presumably took pleasure in giving vent to his feelings on some unfortunate "imp." Well, one day, a pupil, member of a highly respected family, after attending school for only six months, was expelled for apparently "trivial" reasons. However, all efforts to effect a reconciliation proved futile, and the pupil had to go.

[Editor's Note: Well, if he would be "Bill Sykes" he probably deserved it!]

F.W.H. had given a lesson on Joan of Arc and concluded the lesson by saying that she was eventually captured by the English and burned at the stake as a witch, that being the usual punishment for such beings in those good old days. Next day the children were asked to write a composition on Joan's life and one bright boy who evidently had not heard the master's expression correctly, wrote: "On being captured by the English she was burned at the stake for being a bitch."

One morning W.C. was conducting a reading lesson on "Decision" from the Royal Reader Sequel to No. 5. Familiar figures about 1896—Constable (Fatty) Scully on his charger; Rev. Father Ginity and his constant companion, the fox terrier; a youth indefatigably playing trams, by careering up and down the school path, incessantly blowing a tram whistle and pushing a small wheelbarrow, when another notable face would appear at the window with a yell, "You get back home!"—Tommy Turvey, College undergraduate?

The school records of 1879 disclose a complaint that P.B.P.'s goat was creating a nuisance in the playground by molesting the children, the owner being duly notified that the miscreant must be kept outside the bounds of these sacred areas. 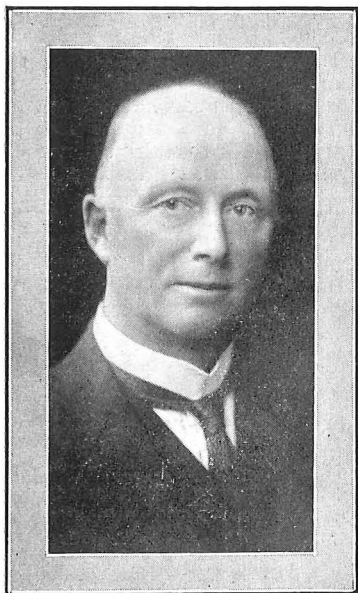

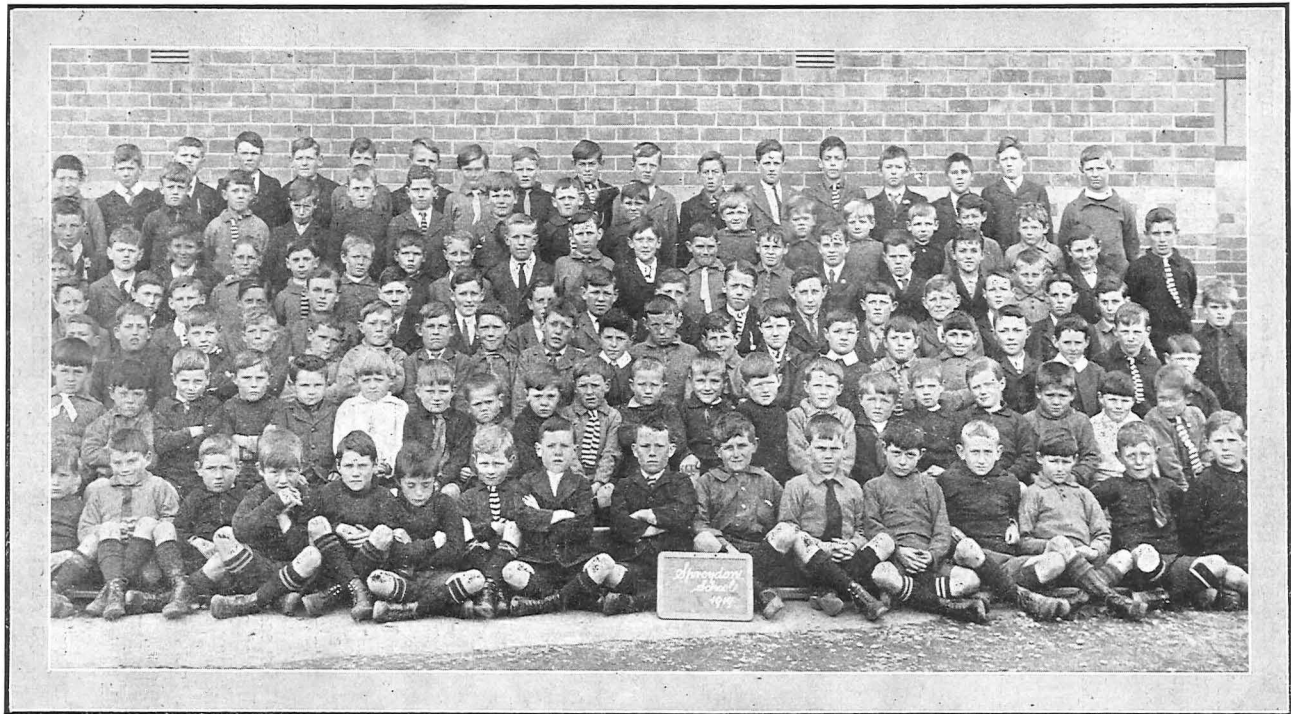

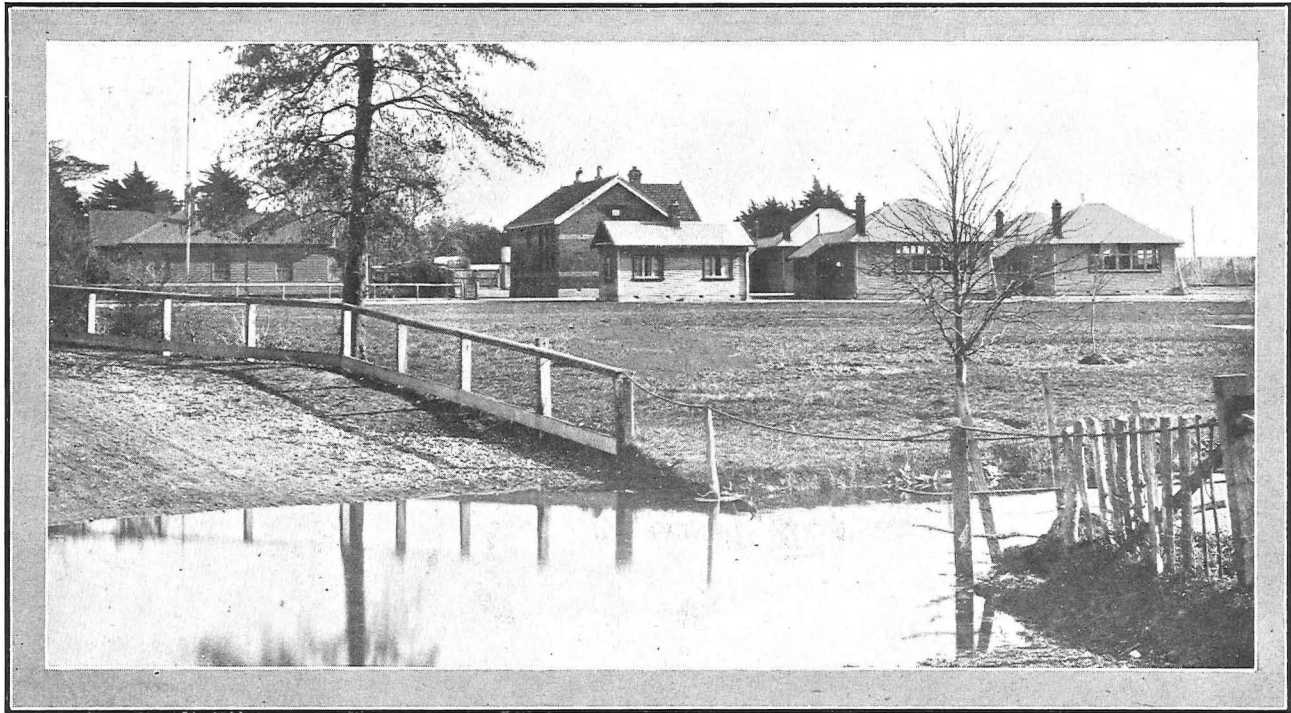

Farewell Note

Friends of our youth! We must leave you forever,
And hasten to dwell in a region unknown:—
Yet time cannot change, nor the broad sea sever,
Hearts firmly united and tried as our own.

IT should not be necessary to again mention that practically all the School records were destroyed by fire in 1927, and that the only record available so far as the ex-pupils' roll is concerned, was the admission register from January, 1916. Prior to this date the roll has been compiled from memory, and with over 2,800 names it is confidently claimed that this figure represents 98 per cent. of the ex-pupils' names.

The committee will be pleased if anyone whose name has been omitted from any of the rolls, and is entitled to be included, will *write* down full particulars and hand to the Secretary at the earliest opportunity, as this Souvenir Booklet, together with supplementary roll No. 1, now in course of compilation, will be accepted by the School Committee as the official School Roll.

Those marked Present Pupil were attending the School on September 8th, 1933.

The ex-staff roll has been much more difficult to compile, but is fairly complete as far as names are concerned. Temporary and relieving staff have been included.

The ex-committeemen and secretaries and the committee's roll are incomplete. After diligent search in old newspapers, no records of the committees marked "Records incomplete" could be found.

At the time of going to press from the best information available over 190 of those ex-pupils whose names appear on the rolls, are now deceased.

The Roll of Honour contains the names of those who actually signed "On Active Service," and those mentioned under "Made the Supreme Sacrifice" were either "Killed in action," or "Died of wounds" during the Great War, on or before June 28th, 1919, the date on which peace was declared.

Whilst honouring those who exposed themselves to great risk, it must be remembered that a number of ex-pupils were detained in New Zealand by authority, "On Home Service," and that they also performed their duty at a time when the Empire most needed it.

The N.Z.E.F. Base Records, the Navy Department, Wellington, A.I.F. Base Records, Australia, and the B.E.F. Base Records, London, have verified the names of those mentioned on the roll who served in the respective forces.

A sword presented to the School by Mr G. L. Comer, is to be used for cutting the Jubilee Cake. The donor expressed a wish that it be deposited in the School, and used at all future Jubilee celebrations for the same purpose, thus forming an association between this, the first celebrated Jubilee and similar occasions.

The Jubilee Executive Committee decided that the sword be mounted on the Roll of Honour.

The old willow trees along the river bank so well known to all ex-pupils, having outgrown themselves or died of disease, were recently removed, thus leaving, what used to be a very picturesque playground, looking somewhat bare, and a very happy thought prompted the School Committee to make the Jubilee an appropriate occasion on which to renew this natural beauty.

Mr and Mrs J. Gilbert Brown, wishing to perpetuate the memory of the celebrations, have very generously presented the school with the necessary trees, great care being exercised in selecting suitable ones for replanting this area, and the avenue so formed is to be named "Jubilee Avenue."

Whilst the work of compiling this Booklet has been a great task it is very gratifying and encouraging to receive so many letters enclosed with the circulars returned from ex-pupils, living far and wide, expressing pleasure that the "old School" will be celebrating its Diamond Jubilee and sending "best wishes for a successful function, and greetings to all old Schoolmates," some, with deep regret that it will not be convenient for them to attend.

To these the committee on behalf of the more fortunate ones, still living in the precincts of the District, reciprocate in their greetings, and can rest assured that though they will not be with us in person, on the days of the functions, the programme has been so arranged that they will be with us in thought at an appropriate moment.

In conclusion the committee desires to thank all those who assisted in making the celebrations and this Souvenir Booklet a success.

Though it may not be policy to discriminate, this opportunity cannot be allowed to lapse without making special mention of the untiring efforts of Mr F. W. Hunnibell in rendering such valuable assistance in compiling the rolls, and to Mr J. Voss for his piecing together of scraps of information and making a very creditable History of the School.

With a hope to re-unite again at the Centenary, best wishes and fraternal greetings.
